## MASARU TAMAMOTO

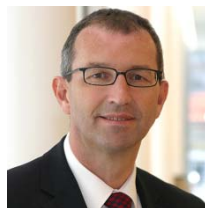

Masaru Tamamoto is a visiting scholar in the Faculty of Asian and Middle Eastern Studies at the University of Cambridge and a visiting associate at Darwin College, Cambridge. He is also a senior fellow of the World Policy Institute, New York.

Tamamoto writes on international relations and particularly on Japanese national identity. His essays have appeared in *Daedalus*, *Far Eastern Economic Review*, *World Policy Journal* and *New York Times*, among others.

Formerly, he was director of the Japan Institute of International Affairs, Tokyo. Prior to that, he was the director of the Center of Asian Studies at American University, Washington DC, where he designed the world's first dual-degree program with Ritsumeikan University in Kyoto.

Tamamoto was born in Tokyo and educated in Japan, Switzerland, Egypt and the United States. He graduated from Brown University and holds a Ph.D. with distinction from Johns Hopkins University.
